VUMC Limited Submission Opportunity 2025 Epilepsy Incidence Among Children in the United States

Applications are due December 3, 2024

VUMC may submit **one (1) application** to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's <u>2025</u> <u>Epilepsy Incidence Among Children in the United States</u> funding opportunity.

Children represent one of the largest populations with newly diagnosed epilepsy. Epilepsy incidence among children is highest in their first year of life and declines by the end of their first decade. In the U.S. general population, studies of pediatric epilepsy incidence and prevalence rates are scant, and less is known about pediatric epilepsy risk factors. Only a few population-based estimates of epilepsy incidence among children in the United States exist, and these are also outdated. Research on risk factors that may affect the development of pediatric epilepsy is also scant.

The purpose of this NOFO is to use standardized definitions of epilepsies and validated methods to:

- 1. Estimate overall epilepsy incidence among U.S. children 0 17 years of age.
- 2. Examine potential disparities in incidence rates of epilepsy stratified by demographic, geographical, social determinants of health, and other characteristics.
- 3. Identify factors that contribute to the risk of developing epilepsy, as well as examine the association between these risk factors and incidence.

The knowledge obtained from this study would help health officials shape public health policies based on epilepsy incidence burden and improve the quality of life for children with epilepsy and their families. Results will inform future research by identifying research gaps in epilepsy incidence as well as risk factors that underlie disparities.
